Brewster whom at 7 1/2 had spent his entire life in a cage in a barn not knowing what it's like to be loved as a dog. Brewster's obvious need of help really grew on me, while I was making my travels to visit the two westies. The fact he was unable to take a treat or show any signs of affection, made me know inside I could not leave him behind. My search for a westie was the result of months of literally being heartbroken, over the passing of my only dog ever- Murray a westie, was my best friend.



August 15<sup>th</sup>, I became Brewster's partner in life. I hope to earn the honor of always being his best friend, and live up to the way he views me. It was a month before I ever heard Brewster bark Brewster only gets the highest quality of treats and food. I grill out chicken for Brew twice a week, he likes that. beside Brew, I am able to calm him when I notice him begin to shake during the night, possibly from having a nightmare. The need to calm him at night has really dwindled. When I get up during the night, I wake Brewster and offer him to go outside which he usually does. Knowing I let him out lots, stopped and really helped to potty train him to not go inside. He is never in a cage, goes for walks lots and lives an opposite life to what he once was living. When it comes to holiday gifts, he gets them immediately. He has already waited way too long for any and all gifts. Brew visits the pet store weekly, just for the fun of shopping, the attention he receives and to meet other dogs. After 3 months, Brew began to play with toys, was so happy, we celebrated and bought lots of toys. Everything Brewster gets is new and just for him. His wardrobe consists of blue polo shirt, two sweaters, two reversible jackets, a snowsuit, hooded red rain coat, Halloween outfits (Bumble Bee, Pirate, Mickey Mouse), Reindeer, Santa etc. Loves snow, going to the dog park to run freely and everywhere else he can be included. The more exercise he gets the happier he is. Brewster now has health insurance and is loved dearly, always treated as #1.

Brewster boarded the Weinermobile in December and next month has plans to meet with Willie Nelson. Brewster has become "Top Dog"! In reality, it's Brewster that rescued me. Brewster & I consider all those involved with WWR Angels. Special thanks to Cheryl & Carol from Brewster.

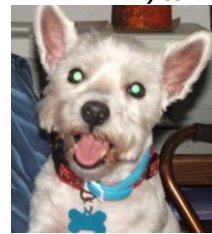

Katy also decided pretty quickly that toys are nifty, especially the kind that she can 'steal' from our daughter's Westie Sam. Katy is about 1/2 of Sam's size and is so small and quick that she grabs Sam's toys and runs away with them before Sam has a chance. We discovered that size has nothing to do with personality, joy of learning new things, and that Katy's pint size body is wrapped around a full-sized Westitude. We didn't know that hot summer day last year when our daughter went to Baraboo to pick her up that Katy would turn out to be the Queen of our Hearts, but she sure is.

## Special Friends to WWR; Brown Deer Animal Hospital and A Breed Apart

WWR makes sure each and every dog in our care has been spayed or neutered, is up-to-date on needed vaccinations, dentals done (if needed) and is micro-chipped and ready to adopt. Occasionally we get a dog with extraordinary medical needs that have to be addressed before the dog is ready to find their forever home and that is when the going gets tougher and a lot more expensive!

This year we have had two dogs, Sarah and Candy, who required additional tests and/or treatment that could have added up to big bills for rescue. In these cases the vet clinics, Brown Deer Animal Hospital in Brown Deer WI and A Breed Apart in Madison WI generously donated services that helped both a rescue dog and WWR! We thank them both and would like to share with you the dog's story as told by their foster moms.

### *Sarah*

As the end of last year, a very scared, sick and nameless westie was surrendered to WWR from a puppy mill. Sarah, as she was quickly named, came to our rescue with a number of health and emotional issues.

As usual, the first stop was at the Brown Deer Animal Hospital in Brown Deer, Wisconsin. The owner, Penny Ness and her two veterinarians, Dr. Ramard Wright and Dr. Marni Schmidt, treated Sarah over the next few months. They spayed her, cleaned her teeth, prescribed nutrition, treated a very deep ear infection as well as removed an external, fortunately benign, tumor. Sarah's health overall was improving greatly. However, she continued to have blood in her stools. It was not a great amount but enough to cause concern and delay her ability to be adopted. Normally in this situation endoscopy by a specialist is recommended to identify the problem. However, at over \$1000.00 for both the specialist and the procedure, it was a big expense for WWR. We have had so many dogs with significant medical issues this past year. Funds were low.

I shared this information with Penny who then discussed it with Dr. Wright. They decided that if WWR would cover the cost of materials (anesthesia, antibiotics, etc.), Penny would donate her facility and her daughter, a veterinarian assistant. Dr. Wright would also donate his time. If the problem was just restricted to the first few inches of the rectum and not too severe, Dr. Wright

felt he could fix it locally. WWR felt it was a reasonable step to avoid having Sarah referred to a specialist for scoping if possible.

Sarah came through with flying colors. The ulcerated lesion was only a few inches in and was able to be repaired. Sarah was adopted a month later to a wonderful family. In a follow up call a few weeks ago, I am happy to report that Sarah continues to have no blood in her stools and is thriving in her new loving home.

WWR is very grateful to the Brown Deer Animal Hospital. The Brown Deer Animal Clinic has been a strong supporter of WWR for the past 7 years. Penny even adopted a while ago, one of our little girls, Grace, who was also a special needs westie. We are very fortunate to have Penny and her team supporting our mission.

### *Candy*

Late last January, we were fortunate to become foster parents of a sweet little female Westie. Our little sweetie, approx. 18 months old, had such a cute personality that we named her 'Candy'. As with many of the Westies that WWR has rescued in the past, Candy was surrendered from a puppy mill located in the Thorp, WI area. Candy was so happy that WWR rescued her from such a challenging living environment. She finally had an identity and a family to care for her. Being a bit malnourished, Candy was excited to have plenty of food to eat. Having come from a puppy mill, Candy now loved the attention that she was able to receive from her foster family. She also loved playing with her two new Westie pals, Cricket and Laci.

Coming from the puppy mill, Candy was in need of veterinary care. Her foster family, living in the Madison, WI area, brought her to A Breed Apart Animal Hospital in Madison, WI. Dr. Kate Peterson provided the needed vaccinations, heartworm testing, fecal check and a thorough physical examination. While listening to Candy's heart, Dr. Peterson detected a heart murmur (a high pitched sound in the upper left chamber of Candy's heart). Without further cardiac testing to obtain a more specific diagnosis, Dr. Peterson was hesitant to spay Candy. Without knowing more about the heart murmur, there was a chance that if the heart murmur was serious, she may not survive the anesthesia and surgery required to spay her. Dr. Peterson recommended that Candy see a veterinary cardiologist and have an ultra sound test of Candy's heart to better understand how serious her heart murmur may be and to provide a more

specific diagnosis of the heart murmur. The cost for the cardiac ultra sound and the veterinary cardiologist to perform the testing was estimated to cost \$220. Candy's foster mother mentioned to Dr. Peterson that WWR's treasury was quite depleted as a result of recent expenses incurred from rescuing several Westies. Before we could consider scheduling the cardiac ultrasound test, the foster mother needed to check with Laura Hager, President of WWR, to see if there was a way in which we could possibly afford to pay for the needed cardiac ultra-sound.

Later in the afternoon of Candy's veterinary appointment with Dr. Peterson, her foster mother received a phone call from A Breed Apart Animal Hospital. Dr. Kate Peterson had called the veterinary cardiologist, Dr. Hattie Bortnowski, and explained that she had examined Candy and had detected a heart murmur that needed further testing and diagnosis. Dr. Peterson also explained to Dr. Bortnowski that WWR had limited funds and may not be able to afford to have the ultrasound test performed for Candy. Dr. Hattie Bortnowski agreed to come to A Breed Apart Animal Hospital and donate her time and equipment to perform the needed cardiac ultrasound test. Dr. Kate Peterson was willing to provide the time and facility for Candy to receive her ultrasound test. As a result, Candy was able to receive her cardiac ultrasound for free.

A few weeks later, the good news regarding Candy's ultrasound test got even better when Dr. Bortnowski examined Candy. Dr. Bortnowski found that Candy's ventricle valve has a small defect, however, the heart murmur is not serious and should not cause her any issues short or long term. There are no additional recommended tests or treatments needed. Candy should live a long and healthy life.

After the ultrasound test confirmed no serious issues with Candy's heart, she was then able to be spayed. Candy was adopted in March by a wonderful family from West Bend, WI. Candy, now known as Lacy, is very happy and healthy in her new forever home. She has a wonderful playmate, a Westie named Lucky, who plays with her every day. She thanks her lucky stars for having WWR rescue her from the puppy mill, for her foster family for taking care of her, for Dr. Kate Peterson and Dr. Hattie Bortnowski for providing her with the veterinary care she needed, and for the wonderful adoptive family that loves her and makes her life complete.

WWR is very grateful to Dr. Hattie Bortnowski for the free cardiac ultrasound testing for Candy/Lacy and for Dr. Kate Peterson and the A Breed Apart Animal Hospital and for the wonderful vet care they provide to WWR rescue Westies. A Breed Apart Animal Hospital has been and continues to be a strong supporter of WWR.
